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Purpose of Policy

- This policy details Dundalk Institute of Technology's policy in relation to the awards it makes/confers.
- This policy should be read in conjunction with the *Policy on the Design and Approval of Programmes and Guidelines* for *Design of Part-Time Programmes* and the Micro-credentials Policy (https://www.dkit.ie/about-dkit/policies-and-guidelines/academic-policies.html) (See references on policy coversheet).

Application and Scope

• This policy applies to all students and staff at Dundalk Institute of Technology.

Context-Designated Awarding Body (DAB)

- Following the enactment of the Qualifications and Quality Assurance (Education and Training) Amendment Act 2019 (referred to as the Act subsequently) (<u>http://www.irishstatutebook.ie/eli/2019/act/32/enacted/en/html</u>), Dundalk Institute of Technology (DkIT) has become a *Designated Awarding Body or DAB*. A Designated Awarding Body is a body with the authority in law to make awards and to whom the 2012 (<u>http://www.irishstatutebook.ie/eli/2012/act/28/enacted/en/html</u>) and subsequent amended 2019 Acts apply.
- When an award is granted by Dundalk Institute of Technology as a Designated Awarding Body (DAB) it must:
 - Ensure that each award made is recognised within the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) including those awards made on behalf of linked providers. The requirement for DkIT to comply with the NFQ is set out in Section 43 of the Act.
 - Ensure that learners enrolled on programmes leading to awards recognised within the NFQ acquire the standard of knowledge, skill or competence associated with the level of that award.
 - Establish procedures for the certification of awards and maintenance of learner and award records. These procedures shall have regard to:
 - Award level, award class and type in the NFQ, including references to the total credit value of the award.
 - Other such references that facilitate the implementation of the NFQ, such as the European Diploma Supplement (EDS).

National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ)

• The NFQ (National Framework of Qualifications) (Figure 1) is a framework for the development, recognition and award of qualifications in Ireland which encompasses all

awards for all aspects of education and training. It is a framework through which all learning achievements may be measured and related to each other in a coherent way.

• The NFQ is a system of levels for relating different qualifications (i.e. awards) to one another. These levels are described in terms of general (non-subject-specific) indicators of a person's knowledge, skill and competence; that is, standards for their learning achievements.

Award Classifications

• Awards at DkIT are classified as Major Awards and Non-major Awards. Non-major Awards is the collective term for awards with a smaller volume and more narrow learning outcomes than Major awards. There are three categories of Non-major award: Minor, Special-purpose and Supplemental (Table 1).

Award	Description
Classification	
Major	A major award is the principal class of award made at a level.
Minor	Minor awards provide recognition for learners who achieve a range of learning outcomes, but not the specific combination of learning outcomes required for a major award. This recognition will have relevance in its own right. Minor awards may facilitate credit or exemptions towards other awards of DkIT and/or external academic professional bodies.
Supplemental	Supplemental awards are for learning which is additional to a previous award. It is designed for education and training with respect to an occupation or profession and may be for updating of education and/or professional development.
Special-Purpose	A special purpose award is made for specific, relatively narrow purposes (e.g. legislative, regulatory, economic, social or

personal learning requirements). They may or may not contain
learning outcomes from a major award.

European Credit Transfer Accumulation System (ECTS)

• The volume of learning associated with an award is specified using the European Credit Transfer Accumulation System (ECTS) (<u>https://ec.europa.eu/education/resources-and-tools/european-credit-transfer-and-accumulation-system-ects_en</u>). ECTS credits represent learning based on defined learning outcomes and their associated workload.

Award Standards

- The NFQ provides generic Award-Type Descriptors which form the basis of all awards standards at Dundalk Institute of Technology (DkIT). Award-Type Descriptors are part of the NFQ and all recognised awards must be consistent with one of these descriptors where one has been determined for the award-type.
- Award standards identify the expected outcomes of learning, inclusive of all education and training for a particular award-type. The standards determine the knowledge, know-how and skill, and competence that are expected from the learner who is to receive an award. They include both general standards for a particular award-type and specific standards for named awards in particular subjects or fields of learning. Learners holding awards of the same award-type should have comparable standards of knowledge, skill and competence.
- DkIT has adopted the following award standards in respect of programmes (adopted from the Quality and Qualifications (QQI) Higher Education (HE) Award Standards (<u>https://www.qqi.ie/what-we-do/qqi-awards/qqi-awards-standards</u>):

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¹ Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) recommendation on the titling of Minor, Special Purpose and Supplemental awards for statutory awarding bodies (QQI, 21st February 2025):

The NFQ level of the award is required to appear on the diploma supplement and academic transcript. This recommendation does not affect awards already conferred.

The question of whether and when the word "professional" may prefix the award stems is under discussion. This recommendation does not address such usage. It is recommended that prefixes that are used by major award types be avoided - e.g., advanced, higher, postgraduate (with diploma), or prefixes that are likely to cause confusion between major award types and non-major awards).

For the avoidance of doubt, use of the "Postgraduate Certificate" stem for minor, special purpose and supplemental awards where the award involves fewer than 60 ECTS is consistent with this recommendation. However, the Postgraduate Diploma stem is reserved in the NFQ for major awards.

² There are some in the Irish Register of Qualifications (IRQ). Note the Postgraduate Diploma at NFQ level 9 is a major award type and this stem cannot be used for minor, special purpose or supplemental awards.

³ In accordance with QQI's Titling of Minor, Special-Purpose and Supplemental Awards recommendation (effective from 23rd May 2025), the use of the "*Postgraduate Certificate*" stem at NFQ Level 9 is permitted solely in respect of legacy awards that were validated on or before 23rd May 2025. Otherwise, the "*Certificate*" stem at NFQ Level 9 should be used.

- The Academic Council can consider derogations from Schools should Professional, Regulatory and Statutory Body (PRSB) requirements not align with DkIT's permissible awards. Approved derogations will be recorded with the register/listing of awards (see Appendix 1).
- Higher Education and Training (HET) major named awards (what the learner receives; a named award is associated with a level in the NFQ through the award type to which it belongs) shall have the following form (see Table 3):

[Named Award Stem] in [Specialisation] (e.g., Bachelor of Science in Computing)

- The overall length of a named award is limited to 43 characters to ensure that it can be printed clearly on awards parchments. Normally only the award stem names are 'standardised' unless otherwise determined by the relevant award standard. The remainder of the named award is agreed at programme validation.
- DkIT supports greater specificity of award titles but not the proliferation of such titles. Table 3 provides the awards titles that are permissible at DkIT (undergraduate and taught postgraduate programmes plus research programmes).

Award Parchments

- Once an award has been confirmed in accordance with Institute policy and procedures award parchments are issued to students, normally at a formal public conferring ceremony. An education and training award signifies a significant achievement and it is fitting that there be a formal public announcement of all awards made.
- A formal public conferring ceremony is arranged for each cohort of higher education and training (HET) graduands in accordance with DkIT's protocols for conferring (which includes academicals (caps, academic gowns, hoods and epitogues) and the conduct of the conferring ceremonies.
- Parchments are designed to be clear and verifiable and contain security features that reduce the risk of fraud.
- A DkIT parchment will contain the following information:
 - "The Institute, by virtue of the authority vested in it under Section 36 of the Qualifications and Quality Assurance (Education and Training) (Amendment) Act 2019 has conferred on [name of graduand] the award of [award title/named award], [award classification] Date of Award."
